

PHONOLOGICAL AWARENESS

WHAT IS PHONOLOGICAL AWARENESS?

Phonological awareness is **associated with academic skills, including learning to read and write difficult or unfamiliar words**. Children who demonstrate difficulties with phonological awareness may experience challenges with reading and writing tasks.

Most of the below skills should be present by Grade 3 or the beginning of Stage 2.





Segmenting into syllables (e.g. clap all the syllables in kangaroo)



/s/

Identifying sounds in words (e.g. what is the first sound in cat?)







Recognising and creating rhyming words

(e.g. what rhymes with cat OR does cat and may rhyme?)



c-a-t

Segmentation of sounds (e.g. tell me each sound you hear in the word cat?)





Blending syllables

(e.g. I am going to say parts of a word. Tell me what the word is 'pan-da') m-oo-n



Blending sounds

(e.g. put these sounds together to make a word 'moon')



-straw

berry

Deletion of syllables

(e.g. say the word strawberry. Now say it without saying 'straw)



brain

Addition of sounds

(e.g. say rain, now say rain with b in the beginning)







Manipulation of sound

(e.g. change the 's' in 'sad' to a 'd' and say the new word)

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
